bring him back the MP4 player and the change. In return, he


promised to pay me €5."

After reading the information on the euro banknotes and coins displayed at the exhibition, Anna says, "Look! It's easy to tell whether or not a euro banknote is genuine. You just have to check three security features. You can't go wrong! You start by feeling the banknote. It must have a crisp texture and be thicker in certain places. Next, you check the watermark, and then the hologram."

Alex: "Anna, stop talking to us as if we were experts. Can you explain that gobbledygook in English, please? How did you tell that Billy Foxham's banknotes were fakes by holding them up to the light?"


Anna: "I was checking the watermark. Watermarks have been used for a long time in the white part of banknotes.

Look closely. When you hold it up to the light, a ghost image of the main design on the banknote and the value of the banknote appear. For example, when you hold a €50 note against a light source, you can see a Renaissance-style window and the figure 50."

Philip: "Cool! Quite the private detective, aren't you! But what's with all this 'Renaissance' stuff?"

Anna: "Oh, sorry. I forgot to mention that all seven euro banknotes feature different European architectural styles from ancient times through to today."

Alex and Philip: "You've gone way over our heads, now!"



Watermark

A shadow-like image and the value become visible.

Feel of the paper

The paper feels crisp, firm and thicker in some parts.

Security thread

A dark line becomes visible.

Hologram

The value and the "€" symbol or a window appear.

Anna: "Oh, come on! It's a piece of cake to check these banknotes. You look at the main design on the note and check to see whether it is repeated in the watermark."

Alex: "And what about the hologram?"

Anna: "Have you noticed the shiny, silver-coloured part of the note? That's the hologram. Watch what happens when you tilt the banknote back and forth a few times. No, not like that! Don't wave it all over the place - do it gently! Can you see how the picture shifts between the "€" symbol and the value of the banknote?"

Philip: "Oh yeah! I reckon that, after this little adventure, I'll also be paying a lot closer attention to euro banknotes! It's not that hard, after all."

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
